


LAUDERDALE COUNTY

Alex Haley Museum and Interpretive Center 200 Church St, Henning, TN 38041
The museum promotes the legacy of Alex Haley, author of Roots, and features his grandfather's home.

Canfield Cemetery

236 Scott Drive, Ripley, TN 38063 Louis Napoleon Nelson, a locally significant historical figure, is buried here. Nelson and his descendants have maintained that Nelson was a soldier in the Confederate Army, although his pension papers state he was a servant and a cook.

Sugar Hill/ Lauderdale County Museum 123 S. Jefferson St., Ripley, TN 38063 One of Ripley's earliest frame homes, it was built by Joseph Wardlaw's enslaved laborers, Tom and Hiliary.

FAYETTE COUNTY

McFerren's Store

TN-76 Somerville, TN 38068 35.220877, -89.349645 Operated by John and Viola McFerren, this grocery served Black Fayette County residents during the Tent City movement.

"Mississippi" Fred McDowell Marker

5725 TN-57, Rossville, TN 38066 Marker commemorating the legendary blues artist.

SHELBY COUNTY


Ida B. Wells School

4140 TN-205 Eads, TN 38028

One of the few remaining schools for African American children built with funds from the Sears, Roebuck & Company magnate Julius Rosenwald.

Zion Cemetery

1426 S Pkwy E, Memphis, TN 38106 Founded in 1876 by the United Sons and Daughters of Zion, it holds the graves of the People's Grocery lynching victims.



TIPTON COUNTY

Canaan Baptist Church

211 N Main St, Covington, TN 38019 Built around 1917 by the McCaddens, an African American family of skilled craftspeople.

Dr. Thomas H. Price House

620 N Main St Covington, TN 3801 The home belonged to Dr. Price, a local African American doctor.

Malone Cemetery/Canaan Cemetery

Intersection of Mason Malone Rd and Pickens Store Rd., Mason, TN 38049 35.443907, -89.605195

Descendants of the enslaved workers of the Maj. Stephen W. Malone plantation reportedly still use the cemetery.
